BDZW

The doctor on the gates.

Dr Wright's initials on the gate to St John's churchyard. The other gate bears the date of his death, 1935. Photo © The Author Ometimes I am asked why the gates to the churchyard extension in Coltishall bear the letters BDZW. They are the initials of



Bernard **D**uncan **Z**orapore **W**right MRCS, LRCP (London)

a local physician, who was born in 1863, the second son of John William Zorapore Wright JP, of Barton Fields, Canterbury, Kent. He was educated at Rugby and St Bartholomew's Hospital, London. He became a Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians in 1887.

He commenced practice in Coltishall in partnership with Wilfred Ashwell MRCS, LRCP (London) in 1888. Amongst his many roles he served as Medical Officer of Health to Smallburgh District Council, Surgeon to the Manchester Union of Oddfellows and to the Foresters. He was also Medical Officer and Public Vaccinator to the Aylsham Poor Law Union and Surgeon to Coltishall Cottage Hospital (aka the Nursing Home).

Away from work, he lived in The Old House, Coltishall, was a churchwarden at the parish church, St John's, and enjoyed shooting and golf. He was a member of the Royal Automobile Club and the Royal Norwich Golf Club. In January 1915 he was initiated into the Unity Lodge, North Walsham, as a Freemason. He was also Chairman of the Management Committee of the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital (NNH) in 1926 and 1930.

In 1888, he married Alice, daughter of William Kent, from Queensland Australia with whom he had a daughter, Mary Zorapore Wright (1889-1956) who married Frederick William Joy in 1923 in Smallburgh, and a son, John Zorapore Wright (1893 – 1922).

His partnership with Dr Ashwell was dissolved by mutual consent in 1913, after which he worked with a Dr Taylor before retiring to Hoveton. He died in June 1935 at Crabbetts, Hoveton St John, leaving £28,177 to his widow and is buried near his birthplace in Kent. After his death, the Chairman of the House Committee of the NNH commented that, '[Dr Wright] had a genial and unique personality, overflowing with human sympathy, and steadied by his great common sense.'

He was commemorated by the installation of gates bearing his initials at Coltishall Nursing Home. After the home was closed, it was announced that the gates, having been purchased by public subscription, would be re-hung as the entrance to the new churchyard of St John's Coltishall, where he had been Churchwarden. They remain there today but there is a certain irony that a man whose vocation was saving lives should be commemorated outside a burial place, although of course that was not the original intention.

The name 'Zorapore' is intriguing, but I can reveal that it refers to a village in India. Col (Later Lt Gen.) Thomas Wright CB, Dr Wright's grandfather, was badly wounded as a result of a knife attack whilst being employed by the East India Company in the battle of Zorapore (aka Zorapoor), part of a campaign to quell the uprising of the Nawab of Kurnool on 18 October 1839. Perhaps as a thanksgiving for his being spared, members of his family henceforth bore the name of the village.

TRAFFIC NEWS from Broadland District Council- January 2025 (Update on B1150)

I submitted a formal objection on behalf of the B1150 Group in response to North Norfolk District Council's (NNDC) latest local plan public consultation, in respect of the further proposed development of an additional 330 new homes in North Walsham.

Labour Government has forced planning authorities to increase housing numbers through changes to the National Planning Policy Framework; North Walsham will see more population growth than the circa 40% increase predicted from the 2000 homes already planned. Strategic housing growth without any significant Government funding for adequate road infrastructure, will have a detrimental impact on the B1150 in Coltishall & Horstead.



Highway Network & Digital Innovation Team at County Council produced a draft evaluation report entitled: 'B1150 Coltishall: 7.5 tonne weight restriction', which was discussed at the last B1150 Special Interest Group. Two main alternative HGV routes which had serious limitations, plus buses & coaches would be exempt from a weight limit as are public service vehicles, plus agricultural vehicles, all of which due to their size also struggle to negotiate the pinch point at the Island bend. There is no easy solution to divert approximately 600 HGV a day away from Coltishall.

Cllr. Whymark & I met the highways team responsible for the report, to discuss other options which should be explored as an alternative to introducing a 7.5 tonne weight restriction. Cllr. Whymark has committed £8k of his highways budget to develop this work further, which will include any alternative traffic safety measures for Coltishall, and we expect an update in March. Planning Inspector Mr David Reed has described the road as 'a sub-optimal route', and our Local Police Inspector has stated, 'whilst I recognise a risk to those using the pavements, there is also danger of gridlock causing issues for emergency vehicles trying to attend emergencies'.

We have witnessed nasty accidents and tailbacks causing an ambulance on blue lights to be delayed for 20 minutes, and just prior to Christmas the newly built brick wall opposite 'Island' fuel station was damaged after being hit by a large vehicle.

However, notwithstanding our objections, I have asked that traffic mitigation measures already agreed for Coltishall & Horstead must be explicitly written into NNDC's local plan policy. Furthermore, requested a transport assessment in response to the additional homes, which examines the wider highway network, in particular appropriate measures and provision of funding to address traffic congestion, measures which should include but are not limited to, implementing a 7.5 tonne weight restriction to alleviate the problem of gridlock.



A Coltishall By-pass? Is it a viable project or not?

Reader letter from Tony Tovell

What have the following communities got in common; Aylsham, Holt, Dereham, North Walsham, Long Stratton, Stalham and Swaffham? Yes of course, they all benefit from their own by-pass. You might well wonder therefore, don't Coltishall and Horstead qualify for their own by-pass too?

Other communities in our county might well argue that their needs are greater than ours – and Wroxham would likely be one of those. Their desire for a by-pass goes back many years, so could their needs be viewed as greater than ours?

We know that bypasses make huge demands on financial resources, and that any application from a community has to meet many criteria. Applications must be viable and attractive propositions – and have a huge amount of support from parishioners.

Therefore, should we consider the possibility of presenting a joint application on behalf of both Coltishall & Horstead and Wroxham communities? This approach could be more attractive environmentally, socially and economically.

I believe such mutual beneficial solution is possible. A new roundabout on the Northern Distributer Road, (located between the current Coltishall Road roundabout and Wroxham Road roundabout) with a new road heading north, crossing the River Bure, the B1354 and the Bure Valley Railway line, linking to a second new roundabout or junction, where traffic could divide on to the North Walsham and Stalham roads seems a possibility worth exploring! (See rough map)

The real benefit would be to restrict all heavy duty traffic from the centre of each community and provide an important relief to both communities' heavily over-used river bridges.

Expensive? Yes - but with so much new housing currently being pursued in the county generally and specifically in north Norfolk, surely sufficient finance could be found! The real benefits would be enormous for both communities and therefore, why not consider this as an alternative option worth exploring?



History of the East Anglian Air Ambulance

It was in the late 1990s when pilot, Captain Gerry Hermer AFC, Andrew Edgerton-Smith MBE, then a Non-Executive Chairman of East Anglian NHS Ambulance Trust, and Patrick Peal MBE, MD of a PR company, met to discuss the possibility of securing sponsorship for a trial air ambulance provision for Norfolk.

Initial approaches for support were made and confidence was built to pursue the project. In a largely rural and agricultural region, reaching seriously injured and unwell people in the quickest time possible was vital. In November 1999, a further meeting took place between Gerry, Patrick and Andrew to consider the benefits of building on an earlier sponsored project, whether it might be possible to establish a charity to provide

this service and, if so, how it might be organised. Shortly afterwards, in 2000, an appeal was launched, with the support of horse racing jockey Frankie Dettori, to operate the first helicopter for the new East Anglian Air Ambulance (EAAA). Both Andrew and Patrick were subsequently awarded MBEs for their work founding a local air ambulance.

As EAAA nears its 25th year of operation, it now provides a 24/7 life-saving service, by air and road, to communities Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire – an area of over 5,000 square miles. One of EAAA's founders, Gerry Hermer, whose dedication to the whole aviation industry has spanned more than five decades, reflects on where it all began and how public support, donations and fundraising continue to make EAAA's life-saving treatment and care possible.

"In those early days the EAAA helicopter, which was a Bolkow BO105, flew once a week with a paramedic on board, but it became operational seven days a week — during the daytime - in July 2001. A considerable financial injection from the Automobile Association (AA) enabled the service to increase to seven days a week (this is why the EAAA helicopters are yellow). From 2002, doctors started flying with EAAA, some of whom are still with the charity today.

Those early days built a firm foundation from which the charity could grow, supported almost entirely by the kindness and generosity of people in the communities served by EAAA.

"By November 2006, a Bolkow BK117 was ordered from Germany. This more modern helicopter provided a great increase in cabin space for the medical crew and patient. EAAA ended the year with the service becoming ever busier, with tasking up by 20% on the previous year. An appeal was launched to extend

the service to Bedfordshire. The service became operational just four months later with a second BK117 in place covering Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire five days a week with the call sign 'Anglia Two,' while Anglia One covered Norfolk and Suffolk," Gerry adds.

In April 2015, EAAA received the UK's first H145 helicopter, which is an up-to-date development of the existing BK117. From 2015 – 2017, the then Duke of Cambridge, William Wales, flew shifts as a HEMS (Helicopter Emergency Medical Service) pilot with EAAA. Her Majesty the Queen and HRH the Duke of Edinburgh visited EAAA in July 2016. During the visit, Her Majesty opened the charity's Cambridge operating base, the Egerton-Smith Centre, which is sited at Cambridge (Marshalls) Airport, before meeting some of the charity's volunteers, patients, crew and support staff.

"For me, this was one of moments which demonstrated how far the charity had come and the life-saving impact of public donations,"

Gerry, who was previously awarded the Air Force Cross when he was flying Search and Rescue helicopters in the RAF, was humbled to receive three major awards for his work with air ambulances: A Lifetime Achievement Awards from the Association of Air Ambulances (2016) and the British Helicopter Association (2017), followed the Honourable Company of Air Pilots Sword of Honour (2018). While he retired from his role as one of the founding members and aviation consultant in March 2017, the charity remains close to his heart.

Helimed House, the charity's Norwich base, was officially opened in 2021 and provides the facilities for a 24/7 lifesaving service. In February 2022, EAAA became the first air ambulance in the UK to upgrade its Anglia One (Norwich) Airbus H145 helicopter with a new five blade rotor head.

The charity now flies with at least one doctor and one critical care paramedic on every shift. This brings extra skills, normally seen in an emergency department, to the patient wherever it is needed in an emergency. This could be

at the roadside, in the community, or in the patient's own home, for example. This can be of enormous benefit to critically ill patients, particularly in the very rural area of East Anglia when the travel time to the nearest hospital by road may be over an hour. For some of these patients, reducing the time to receive enhanced clinical treatment and care may make the difference between life and death.

In addition to EAAA's two H145 helicopters, the charity has critical care cars which provide extra resilience to reach people needing life-saving care quickly by road. With the exception of a stretcher, the critical care cars are equipped with the same high standard of medical monitoring and assessment equipment as the two helicopters. The cars are sometimes the best option to reach patients in the quickest time, especially if the medical emergency is in a location where the helicopters cannot easily land, such as urban areas, or in the event of inclement weather when the conditions are out of legal flying limits. EAAA is now tasked, on average, eight times a day and serves a community of over three million people. The 24/7 crews collaborate with the region's other emergency services to respond to the most serious medical emergencies. In 2023/24, for the second year running, EAAA experienced its busiest 12 months on record, treating 2,042 people in urgent need of advanced critical care.

The charity's research arm continues to drive innovation in the field of prehospital emergency care, the community CPR training team provides training in life-saving skills to others, and EAAA's dedicated Aftercare service offers practical and emotional support to former patients and their families. EAAA receives no regular government funding, relying almost entirely on public support to develop and deliver its 24/7 life-saving service and, in 2024, marked the milestone of treating 25,000 patients since the charity was founded.

One of those patients was Ruth Baron from Norfolk, who suffered a cardiac arrest at her home in February 2024. Ruth says, "Before my incident, I was already a supporter of East Anglian Air Ambulance as I had previously joined their lottery. Three years later, I needed them. To the people who donate £5, £10 or whatever they can afford, thank you; you know it is going towards saving lives"

"I am grateful you were there for me."

EAAA is now one of the most recognised and trusted charities in East Anglia. With a clinical team and ground staff, who work to raise the funds needed to treat six people every day, EAAA was one of just seven charities to be named as a top employer on The Sunday Times Best Places to Work 2023 list.

As East Anglian Air Ambulance approaches its 25th anniversary in September 2025.

Growing non and low alcohol beers and wines. They are boosting business and health too, in our pubs and restaurants

A new development in what we all enjoy doing - drinking - a part of enjoying ourselves, but getting safer while doing it.

Non-alcoholic drinks have arrived and grown over the last couple of years – to increase the number of people having drinks out – and at home, but of beers and wines that reduce the risks to life should you consume more than you should. And the signs are more and more people – particularly the young – are praising the trend which is helping all, pubs and restaurants included!



Soaring costs and customers watching their spending is putting the hospitality industry under intense pressure, but for the traditional British pub non and low alcohol beers are a good solution.

A main reason for the rise of non-alcoholic drinks is an increased national focus on health and wellness. The NHS points out numerous benefits of reducing alcohol intake, including enhanced energy levels, healthier skin, and mood improvement. Young people particularly are spotting and going for this - they are more health-conscious and attentive to the long-term impacts of alcohol on their well-being.

Coupled with this is the consideration of calorie intake; non-alcoholic drinks often have lower calorie content than their alcoholic counterparts, aligning with the growing preference for healthier lifestyle choices

A record 140 million pints of no or low-alcohol beer have been sold in 2024, up 12% on 2023, with 86% of hostelries now selling the non-intoxicating brews. And its growing. Wine trends also may go this route. It reflects a steady rise in the popularity of non-alcoholic drinks - 8% of pubs that serve the alternative beer now sell it on draught, up from just 2% in 2019. The increasing range of options for drinkers means the pub is "even more inclusive and welcoming than ever before ...", the British Beer and Pub Association (BBPA) said.



Interested in learning more about mental health?



It's cold! It's cold while I write this and it's probably cold as you read it. This time of year we feel the chill and we long for the warmth of summer. Sitting under a tree, trying to keep cool with an iced drink feels almost unimaginable. We might not like it too hot but we want to be warm.

We don't just want a decent heater, a working boiler or a roaring fire, though. We want the people around them. When I imagine warmth I imagine coming into a pub on a February evening to be greeted by the blast of heat from a fire and the laughter of friends. The warmth is both. It comes from the fire and the friends.

My hunch is that it is worth it. I find that weekly at *Tiddlers*, our toddler group. Getting out the toys again, setting up the chairs again, can feel like a slog in February. But the smiles of the children and the kind chat of parents and grandparents warms me every week. Where can you find that warmth this month? Go on,

The November meeting of the Probus Club of Broadlands took place at the Wroxham Hotel on the on the 27th of the month. The meeting started with the usual 2 course meal.

Following the meal, we were entertained by one of our members, Mike Bowden who gave us an insight into some experiences and examples, of incidents and accidents, within the Helicopter operating environment.

Mike started his working career training and becoming an electric engineer. Well into this career he felt he needed a change and took the decision to train as a helicopter pilot. To achieve this new aim, he went to the States to carry out the relevant training to gain the appropriate licence. His first job as a helicopter pilot was back in the Uk working for Sloane Helicopters where he stayed for 25years. Mike ran safety courses as part of his role and one day experienced an issue himself where one fuel gauge indicated it was low on fuel. Mike, knowing he had fuelled the aircraft himself before departure was not concerned. However, when the engine stopped, he suddenly had to act quickly to get the aircraft safely back on the ground. Luckily the aircraft was in the hover when the engine stopped and he was able to drop the aircraft to the ground safely using the rotor to control the speed of the decent. The cause turned out to be a blocked vent that would not allow fuel to be drained from the main tank. The fuel in the emergency tank had been fully used thus the engine failed. A serious learning experience for Mike

Continuing his talk, he gave us an insight into a number of other helicopter incidents many of which related to fuel issues. This included the accident in Scotland where a Police helicopter crashed onto the roof of a public house with sadly fatalities involved.

Members found the talk very enlightening and interesting. Mike was thanked for his presentation which had given a real insight to the operation of these incredible machines.


